Grandma's Apron

At this time, the Marshall County Historical Museum windows are filled with memories of the kitchens of the past highlighting Grandma's apron and some kitchen gadgets.

"The principle use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, but along with that, it served as a holder for removing hot pans from the oven and it was wonderful for drying children's tears.

From the chicken-coop the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids; and when the weather was cold, grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled it carried out the hulls. In the fall the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds. When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out on the porch and waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields for dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that old-time apron that served so many purposes.

Remember this!! Grandma used to set her hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw. " (Story taken from the internet)

The Moore School was located in the southwest corner of Section 3 in Osage township.

This school was established even before the township was organized. Moore School was formed on April 21, 1855, on the land of Newton Ward.

Moore School continued to educate students into the 1940s. From 1940 to 1945 a total of 47 pupils were instructed in District 12.

Moore School had many teachers. Although most names have been lost, Kathryn Healy (1918-1947) and Anna Egan (1908) both taught in District 12 at some time.

It is proposed to move the school into the far North East area of the uptown pavilion area.


Schools were identified by the school district numbers, but also by proper names. They were sometimes known by the community they served such as Dana Elementary school, in Groveland Township, or names for the township in which they were located, with a modifier for East, West, North or South added, as in Osage Center school.
